Course Description

The sense of touch is our first language used to communicate feelings and provide nourishment. Through touch, infants first experience love, caring, a sense of safety and respect. Infant massage is soothing to the giver and receiver. It has been used as a bonding tool between child and caregiver for many generations and in many cultures. It is also used as a therapeutic tool for "fussy" babies, colic, constipation, or to ease the neuromuscular stress due to deformity and disability. This seminar will cover the history, impact and step by step "how to" of infant massage as an important tool for building the caregiver-child relationship and stimulating the physical development of the baby. The various strokes as outlined in many infant massage classes and books will be demonstrated, practiced and experienced by the participant. How and where to begin using the techniques learned in this seminar will be discussed, along with outlining the certification process and requirements for future consideration. Infant and baby games will also be included as another mean of stimulation and engagement as we discuss the developmental stages of the infant and baby ages 0-6 months.

- 1. Understand the history of infant massage and its use as a therapeutic tool.
- 2. Know the importance of touch for bonding, engagement, and attachment.
- 3. Recognize the appropriate amount and type of stimulation for a babies, ages 0-6 months.
- 4. Use of self as a therapeutic tool for infant massage
- 5. Explain and experience infant massage strokes in a sequential manner for immediate use and practice.
- 6. Apply infant massage principles to "at risk populations" such as pre-maturity, colic, constipation, neurological involvement.
- 7. Use massage techniques and play interaction with the older baby
